The Lessons

A reading from Amos (5:18–24)

Commentary:

Like many Old Testament prophets, Amos spoke of the 'day of the Lord'. He saw it as a time when God would judge sin, even in His own people. Another frequent theme in Amos is the prevalence of social injustice. Many Israelites in Amos' time were looking forward to a coming 'day of the Lord'. However, Amos informed them that before a time of divine blessing there would be a time of divine chastisement. Amos also pointed out the hypocrisy of the peoples' worship, full of ritual but without substance. Instead of the pomp and noise of superficial worship, what God desires from His people is moral and ethical righteousness.

Thus says the Lord, the God of hosts, the Lord: Alas for you who desire the day of the Lord! Why do you want the day of the Lord? It is darkness, not light; as if someone fled from a lion, and was met by a bear; or went into the house and rested a hand against the wall, and was bitten by a snake. Is not the day of the Lord darkness, not light, and gloom with no brightness in it? I hate, I despise your festivals, and I take no delight in your solemn assemblies. Even though you offer me your burnt offerings and grain offerings, I will not accept them; and the offerings of well-being of your fatted animals I will not look upon. Take away from me the noise of your songs; I will not listen to the melody of your harps. But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream.

ANTIPHON

A reading from 1 Thessalonians (4:13–18)

Commentary:

The Thessalonians were new in their faith and one area in which they needed instruction concerned Christ's return from heaven. Paul realized that knowing the bright future awaiting believers who presently sleep in death gives hope to those who mourn. Paul told his readers that Christians who have died will be with Jesus when He returns for His own who still live on earth. From heaven, God will herald the return of Christ. Mortal bodies will become immortal as believers meet Christ in the air, nevermore to be separated from Him. Paul set an example of expectancy for the church, which is to live in anticipation of the Lord's return.

We do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died. For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died. For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord forever. Therefore encourage one another with these words.

Jesus said, "Then the kingdom of heaven will be like this. Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. When the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them; but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. As the bridegroom was delayed, all of them became drowsy and slept. But at midnight there was a shout, 'Look! Here is the bridegroom! Come out to meet him.' Then all those bridesmaids got up and trimmed their lamps. The foolish said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out.' But the wise replied, 'No! there will not be enough for you and for us; you had better go to the dealers and buy some for yourselves.' And while they went to buy it, the

bridegroom came, and those who were ready went with him into the wedding banquet; and the door was shut. Later the other bridesmaids came also, saying, 'Lord, lord, open to us.' But he replied, 'Truly I tell you, I do not know you.' Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour."
