

Commentary: Jeremiah ministered in Judah and called his hearers to turn away from their many sins. Jeremiah voiced a prayer for the people, admitting Israel's sin, yet pleading with God to do something for them for His own reputation's sake, as a God of mercy. However, Jeremiah never forgot that the Lord is a God of justice as well as mercy. The prophet begged God not to abandon His people and acknowledged Him as the only source of blessing, so Jeremiah's hope remained in Him. God had brought calamity and He alone could bring blessing.

Although our iniquities testify against us, act, O LORD, for your name's sake; our apostasies indeed are many, and we have sinned against you. O hope of Israel, its savior in time of trouble, why should you be like a stranger in the land, like a traveler turning aside for the night? Why should you be like someone confused, like a mighty warrior who cannot give help? Yet you, O LORD, are in the midst of us, and we are called by your name; do not forsake us! Thus says the LORD concerning this people: Truly they have loved to wander, they have not restrained their feet; therefore the LORD does not accept them, now he will remember their iniquity and punish their sins. Have you completely rejected Judah? Does your heart loathe Zion? Why have you struck us down so that there is no healing for us? We look for peace, but find no good; for a time of healing, but there is terror instead. We acknowledge our wickedness, O LORD, the iniquity of our ancestors, for we have sinned against you. Do not spurn us, for your name's sake; do not dishonor your glorious throne; remember and do not break your covenant with us. Can any idols of the nations bring rain? Or can the heavens give showers? Is it not you, O LORD our God? We set our hope on you, for it is you who do all this.

Commentary: When he wrote this letter to Timothy from a Roman prison, Paul sensed that he would soon be executed. Paul's life had been a living sacrifice to God since his conversion, but now that life was ebbing away. Paul compared his experiences to a victorious athlete and to a loyal steward of the faith. Because he had been faithful, Paul did not fear dying; instead, he looked forward to seeing his Lord. Paul did not dwell on disappointments and he was not vindictive toward those who had hurt or opposed him. To the very end Paul encouraged Timothy, and even in the face of death, he gave glory to God.

I am already being poured out as a libation, and the time of my departure has come. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have longed for his appearing. 
