

## The First Reading: Isaiah 7:10-16

Commentary: Judah's King Ahaz had a decision to make: would be trust God to protect Ierusalem from enemies, or would he reject God's promised protection and look for a different means of security? God commanded the king to ask for a sign that God would do what He had promised. Ahaz sounded pious when he refused to ask for a sign, but asking for a sign was not the same as testing God, since God had commanded it. Despite Judah's rebellious king, God gave Ahaz and the House of David a sign that He was still with His people. This sign was a major and hopeful messianic prediction for a greater King and a brighter future.

Again the Lord spoke to Ahaz, saying, Ask a sign of the LORD your God; let it be deep as Sheol or high as heaven. But Ahaz said, I will not ask, and I will not put the LORD to the test. Then Isaiah said: "Hear then, O house of David! Is it too little for you to weary mortals, that you weary my God also? Therefore the LORD himself will give you a sign. Look, the young woman is with child and shall bear a son, and shall name him Immanuel. He shall eat curds and honey by the time he knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good. For before the child knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good, the land before whose two kings you are in dread will be deserted."



## The Epistle: Romans 1:1-7

*NRSV*, p. 1026

Commentary: Not much is known about the founding of the church in Rome, but it was probably established by Jewish Christians who settled there after the first waves of persecution dispersed believers throughout the ancient world. By the time Paul wrote this letter, probably in AD 56-57, the church in Rome had gained a reputation for steadfast faithfulness. In these opening verses of the letter, Paul set forth the most fundamental elements of Christianity, explaining that the gospel, which centers on Jesus Christ, fulfills God's promises that were revealed in the Old Testament.

Paul, a servant of Jesus Christ, called to be an apostle, set apart for the gospel of God, which he promised beforehand through his prophets in the holy scriptures, the gospel concerning his Son, who was descended from David according to the flesh and was declared to be Son of God with power according to the spirit of holiness by resurrection from the dead, Jesus Christ our Lord, through whom we have received grace and apostleship to bring about the obedience of faith among all the Gentiles for the sake of his name, including yourselves who are called to belong to Jesus Christ, To all God's beloved in Rome, who are called to be saints: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

## The Holy Gospel: Matthew 1:18–25

*NRSV*, p. 879

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Glory to you, Lord Christ. People

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to

take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet: "Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel," which means, "God is with us." When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.




