

Commentary: Before his birth, Samuel was dedicated to the Lord's service (see 1 Samuel 1). From a very young age his home was with the priests at the house of the Lord, which was then located in Shiloh. At this time in Israel's history, special revelations from God were rare. Samuel, who saw clearly both physically and spiritually, contrasted with Eli, who could not see well either way. God not only called to Samuel, but also stood by him. Samuel listened to the Lord, a response worth emulating.


Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the LORD under Eli. The word of the LORD was rare in those days; visions were not widespread. At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the LORD, where the ark of God was. Then the LORD called, "Samuel! Samuel!" and he said, "Here I am!" and ran to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call; lie down again." So he went and lay down. The LORD called again, "Samuel!" Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call, my son; lie down again." Now Samuel did not yet know the LORD, and the word of the LORD had not yet been revealed to him. The LORD called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." Then Eli perceived that the LORD was calling the boy. Therefore Eli said to Samuel, "Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, 'Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening." So Samuel went and lay down in his place. Now the LORD came and stood there, calling as before, "Samuel! Samuel!" And Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening."

ANTIPHON

How deep I find your thoughts, O / God!* how great is the / sum of them! If I were to count them, they would be more in number than the / sand; * to count them all, my life span would need to be like / yours.

ANTIPHON

Commentary: Some members of the Corinthian church viewed freedom in Christ as license to do whatever they wanted, so Paul emphasized the sanctity of the believer's body as the temple of the Holy Spirit. Paul urged his readers to consider whether their actions were beneficial or potentially harmful to themselves or others. The body is rightly used for God's glory. Believers are united to Christ, consequently it is a very serious matter to give to a prostitute what God has joined to His Son. Paul pointed out that sexual immorality is wrong because it involves sinning against one's body, which belongs to the Lord. It was purchased with a great price, the blood of Jesus Christ.

"All things are lawful for me," but not all things are beneficial. "All things are lawful for me," but I will not be dominated by anything. "Food is meant for the stomach and the stomach for food," and God will destroy both one and the other. The body is meant not for fornication but for the Lord, and the Lord for the body. And God raised the Lord and will also raise us by his power. Do you not know that your bodies are members of Christ? Should I therefore take the members of Christ and make them members of a prostitute? Never! Do you not know that whoever is united to a prostitute becomes one body with her? For it is said, "The two shall be one flesh." But anyone united to the Lord becomes one spirit with him. Shun fornication! Every sin that a person commits is outside the body; but the fornicator sins against the body itself. Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God, and that you are not your own? For you were bought with a price; therefore glorify God in your body.


