Commentary: Jonah was a reluctant prophet who initially ran from God's command to preach repentance in Nineveh. As a result, Jonah spent three miserable days and nights inside a great fish. After that ordeal, when God gave Jonah a second chance, he was ready and willing to obey. Nineveh was a large city and it took several days for Jonah's message to reach everyone. Jonah prophesied impending judgment and his proclamation moved the Ninevites to humble themselves and seek divine mercy. God saw that the Ninevites' repentance was genuine and withheld the judgment that would have befallen them had they persisted in their wickedness:

The word of the LORD came to Jonah a second time, saying, "Get up, go to Nineveh, that great city, and proclaim to it the message that I tell you." So Jonah set out and went to Nineveh, according to the word of the LORD. Now Nineveh was an exceedingly large city, a three days' walk across. Jonah began to go into the city, going a day's walk. And he cried out, "Forty days more, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!" And the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast, and everyone, great and small, put on sackcloth. When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it.

The Epistle: 1 Corinthians 7:29–31

NRSV, p. 1044

Commentary: In the portion of 1 Corinthians from which this passage is taken, Paul was answering questions and addressing topics of concern to the Corinthian church. In these verses, Paul advised his readers to reexamine their relationship to the world because the world, in its present form, is passing away. Time on earth is limited so believers are wise to live with an eternal perspective. Whether single or married, Christ's followers should not be completely engrossed by the things of this world. Paul reminded the Corinthians, and us, that the world is not our home, we are just passing through:

"I mean, brothers and sisters, the appointed time has grown short; from now on, let even those who have wives be as though they had none, and those who mourn as though they were not mourning, and those who rejoice as though they were not rejoicing, and those who buy as though they had no possessions, and those who deal with the world as though they had no dealings with it. For the present form of this world is passing away.
