

The First Reading: Exodus 12:1–4, 11–14

NRSV, p. 57

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt. This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

The Holy Gospel: John 13:1–17, 31b–35

NRSV, p. 983

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "LORD, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "LORD, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean." After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and LORD--and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your LORD and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them. "Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, `Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

If you know these things, blessed are you if you do them."







GOOD FRIDAY

Friday, March 29th | Opportunities at 11:00 AM & 12:00 PM | Mt. Lebanon Chapel*

On Good Friday, we remember the crucifixion and death of Jesus. We will begin at 11:00 a.m. with Stations of the Cross. If you have never participated in the Stations of the Cross, this service follows Jesus' journey to the cross and each station has accompanying readings and prayers. The Stations will start just outside of Mt. Lebanon Chapel and move through the gardens surrounding the Chapel. This will be followed by the Good Friday Liturgy at 12:00 p.m. in the Chapel. You are welcome to attend only one or both.

*Please note that in the event of inclement weather, the Stations of the Cross and Good Friday Service will be relocated to St. James Parish's Downtown campus.

HOLY SATURDAY ~ THE GREAT VIGIL OF EASTER

Saturday, March 30th | Service at 8:00 PM | St. James Parish & Livestream

As its name implies, this service is the chief celebration of Easter; the cornerstone of all Christian liturgy and celebration. It engages all the senses in worship—sight, sound, smell (incense), taste, and touch. It is a service of darkness and light; of word and song; of prayer and action. This year, the Rt. Rev. Henry Parsley will preside over the service and offer the sermon.

At twilight, we welcome the new fire of Easter and process that fire into the dark of the church. We hear the story of God's saving deeds throughout history by way of several readings. We renew our baptismal covenant together before we joyfully proclaim "Alleluia. Christ is risen!" To celebrate this most important moment of the year, we sing songs of praise, we hear the Good News of Easter preached, and then we come to the table to partake in the first Eucharist of Easter. If you have never participated in this particular service, you won't want to miss it!

EASTER DAY

Sunday, March 31st | Multiple Opportunities to Gather in Worship and Celebration | St. James Parish & Livestream

On Easter Sunday, we have many opportunities to worship, celebrate, and serve. One way to share the love of Jesus this Easter Day is through the delivery of Meals on Wheels. On the lawn, we'll be placing a cross and inviting each family to bring flowers. Let us decorate and share our joy with our neighbors.

- 6:30 AM Tower Service The Tower Service is a special offering of St. James Parish that traditionally occurs atop the bell tower (weather and number of attendees permitting) as we greet Easter Morning. We encourage attendees to dress warmly and casually, as the climb to the top of the tower requires crawling through small spaces.
- 8:00 AM Holy Eucharist Rite I Our 8:00 a.m. service follows the Rite I liturgy. With Rite I you'll find a more contemplative service with traditional language and limited us of music and hymns.
- 9:00 AM Holy Eucharist Rite II The 9:00 a.m. service is Rite II and features our adult choir along with more contemporary language. Wiggling, giggling, and sharing are welcome in all services, but the 9:00 is especially conducive to children and families.
- ~10:30 AM The 9:00 service will be followed by our Parish Celebration and Easter Egg Hunt. Children age 2 and younger are invited to a special hunt in the Children's Chapel, while our older children, ages 3 through 5th Grade, are set to hunt in the Lee Parish Hall Multipurpose Room and Gymnasium.
- 11:15 AM Holy Eucharist Rite II The 11:15 a.m. service is Rite II and features our adult choir and brass, along with the readings for Easter Day.

To all who are weary and seek rest; to all who mourn and long for comfort; to all who struggle and desire victory; to all who sin and need a Saviour; to all who are idle and look for service; to all who are strangers and want fellowship; to all who hunger and thirst after righteousness; and to whosoever will come—this church opens wide her doors.
