Senior Warden's Address

A FAREWELL ADDRESS - OUTGOING SENIOR WARDEN LESLIE JARRETT

Dear St. James Parish Family,

When you sit down to reflect on the past year, I wonder where your mind goes first. Often there are pivotal moments in a year, defined by intense emotions that come to mind first. It may be a moment of great joy or it could be sorrow of tragedy. As you step back from those big moments, I hope you feel a sense of belonging, community and grace from our St. James Parish Family.

The Vestry at St. James is charged with furthering the mission and vision of our parish in addition to oversight and responsibility for the financial and property resources of our parish. For a parish of 1,350 members, encompassing an entire city block, this is no small task. We are grateful for the promise that "where two or three are gathered together in my name, I am there among them" (Matt. 18:20). Our vestry meeting conversations and decisions always start with centering ourselves around the presence of God and being mindful of how our actions reflect the call to servant leadership.

We ended the financial year 2023 positively due to generous giving along with careful attention by staff and volunteers to being good stewards of our resources.

Now here we are in 2024, a thriving parish that is 295 years old! While it may be tempting to keep things 'the way it's always been', the reality is a parish thriving after 295 years shows that St. James has been evolving. Let's continue to constantly reflect on and respond to the needs of our parish family and surrounding community. ON FINANCE & STEWARDSHIP

Dear Parish Family,

Our 2024 Stewardship Campaign officially concluded just as we entered the season of giving thanks. Although we all are thankful for the many blessings in each of our lives, the end of this year's campaign gave us the opportunity to focus our thanks on you, the members of this Parish family.

In 2023, we invited you to invest in St. James and its people, its place, and its programs. We asked you to prayerfully consider your pledge and to reach deep to fuel the Church's march into the future. As of Monday, January 22, 2024, we have received 345 pledges totaling \$1,472,355. Every dollar counts and no pledge is too small. As we conclude this campaign and move towards year end, we will partner with the Vestry and others to make our final push. CONGREGATIONAL CARE COMMISSION

Respectfully submitted by Jane Martin, chair of Congregational Care Commission

The committees that work under Congregational Care are busy daily. We strive to support the clergy, and all members who may be going through illness, grief, or celebrations. All who minister would agree that we receive far more than we give. Our ministries could use more help. Please consider joining one of these groups. We ALL are The Church and there are many opportunities to make a difference.

- Care Guild- This team of 15 visits home bound parishioners where they are living. The mission is to let them know they are valued, loved, and not forgotten. Their families are appreciative of this ministry. There were 15-17 visits each month with members making two-five 30-45 minute visits. Care Guilders "touch" parishioners 228 times in a year.
- **Pen pals** (14 members) send cards to parishioners weekly or monthly as health conditions change. There were an estimated 840 cards sent last year to parishioners who were bereaved, or home or facility bound. (Contact: Beth Souther, *bethsoutherfish@gmail.com*)
- **Community of Hope International (COHI)** -St. James is a COHI parish. COHI training equips lay people to serve in all forms of pastoral care. There are presently 39 members who have completed 6 weeks of intensive training for pastoral care ministries. While this training is not a prerequisite for giving pastoral care, it is helpful. Most months continuing education opportunities are offered. (Contact: *cheryl@stjamesp.org*)
- **Confidential Prayer Team** They represent a group of dedicated St. James parishioners who offer intercessory prayer for the needs and concerns of members and friends of St James Parish. All information is held in the strictest confidence. Anyone who feels called to the ministry of confidential prayer, please contact The Rev. Cheryl Brainard. (Contact: *cheryl@stjamesp.org*)
- Flower Guild- 15 members, in teams of two, they deliver the altar flowers after the final Sunday service. The clergy let us know where the flowers are to go and we receive the flowers from the Altar Guild in the sacristy. We have our own note cards in the sacristy to include with the flowers. We may write a note or have the clergy write a quick note to the recipients. (Contact: Jane Martin, *martinjane@ec.rr.com*)
- Hospital Visitors- This small group makes visits as needed and when requests come from the clergy. Please let the church know when you are aware that one of our parishioners is in the hospital. (Contact: The Rev. Cheryl Brainard, *cheryl@stjamesp.org*)
- Living Well in the Midst of Grief- Our Grief Group has approximately 20 members. They meet every first and third Monday. This is a time of sharing, learning, and support for each other. There are also social opportunities for group members. (Contact: The Rev. Cheryl Brainard, *cheryl@stjamesp.org*)
- St. Martha's Guild- This Guild at St. James provides care to our members by delivering meals to the sick, bereaved or those with new babies, writing notes, and making phone calls to individuals and families during life's ups and downs. Each month has a chair and a team. When there is a death in our church family, the clergy offer our funeral reception ministry to the family. We organize, prepare, and put on receptions following funerals as our gift of love.
 - In 2023 we estimate the following numbers but believe the totals are likely higher than these which are averaged.
 - 3 funerals with receptions per month, total 36
 - 12 cards per month, total 144
 - 5 flowers, plants, baby gifts etc. each month, total 60
 - 4 meals or food, total 48

EVANGELISM COMMISSION

The St. James Evangelism Commission reaches out in the name of God to invite others to St. James Parish. They work to ensure that all visitors receive a warm, Christian welcome each Sunday and at special events. This group takes the lead in connecting newcomers to their chosen ministries and helps them to become an integral part of the St James community.

2023 Year in Review:

- Praying Shapes Believing Confirmation classes (Feb 16 & 23, March 2,9, 16, 23, & 30) The Evangelism Commission supplied 2 volunteers for each of the seven classes. These volunteers were responsible for welcome, opening & closing program, introducing speakers, refreshments, lock-up, signage, etc. PSB 2023 had 19 participants, up significantly from previous years.
- Azalea Festival (April 15 & 16) Scheduled and provided docents to open and show Mt Lebanon Chapel to attendees of Azalea Festival. Visitors- approx. 615.
- Newcomer Downtown Tour with Lunch (April 30) 24 newcomers plus an additional 20 church members. Significantly more tour takers than ever before. Lunch was served and table settings were delightful - Our Sunday School classes provided placemats drawn by children.
- Parish Meet & Greet at MLC (July 9) 160 participants joined us for a fun event with elegant food and beverage; parishioners were very supportive and actively engaged with Newcomers.
 22 Newcomers signed up for name tags.
- Newcomer Party at The Hardy's (Oct 8) -Attendance 74; including 48 Newcomers. Fun and very successful; the Hardy's were wonderful hosts.
- St James Orientation for Newcomers (Nov 2, 9, 12, and 16)
 Our "Signature Event" each year. Three evenings designed to connect Newcomers with clergy, vestry, ministries, and history of St James; also includes a tour of downtown facilities. First time use of in-house video Introducing St James Commissions and Ministries to Newcomers; this video was produced by our Communications Director. Avg. Newcomer attendance 20.

FAITH FORMATION - 2023 ADULT OFFERINGS


2023 delivered a robust Adult Faith Formation program at St. James Parish. We continue to offer a hybrid format for multiple classes featuring in-person and digital opportunities to engage. Sunday morning classes started in person with two offerings each Sunday, one of which is also available via Zoom. With the new fall worship schedule, we have seen an impact on classes. We are still in need of more attendees on Sunday mornings to take full advantage of the great offerings put together. And we are also in need of more volunteers to help formulate the programs being offered for the Parish.

Sunday Mornings for Adults: Spring 2023 brought a continuation of the theme, "Who is My Neighbor?"

The **Disciple's Class** met in the Lippitt Room for presentations and discussions. We moved from the commandment to "Love God and Our Neighbor as Ourselves" to "Who is My Neighbor?" In the fall, the Disciple's Class offered presentations and discussions centering on "Living in the Spirit." Their studies focused on the "Fruit of the Spirit" (Galatians 5: 22), the Gifts of the Spirit (I Corinthians 12: 4-11), Our Call to Ministry (Matthew 25: 35 – 40), and The Way of Love (Presiding Bishop Curry's practices for a Jesus-centered life), as well as taking time to explore what it means to listen to the Holy Spirit and to keep the Sabbath.

Faith Discussions, also rounded out Spring 2023 with "Who is My Neighbor" before diving into a Fall Program centered around stand-alone discussion topics led by different members of the class.







Small Group Study:

- A Study of the Passion Narrative: During the season of Lent the clergy led a series on the Passion of Christ as part of our Lenten Dinner Series.
- **Grief Group:** A group of parishioners experiencing loss in their lives has met twice monthly with Cheryl Brainard. This group continues to attract new members.
- Exploring the Sabbath Group: Fall 2023 a group of parishioners met at group member homes to study what it means to keep the Sabbath. Guidance was provided by Bishop Henry Parsley and Rev. Mary McKnight.
- Morning Prayer Zoom: Started early in the pandemic, this group continues to meet daily to engage in Morning Prayer. This group has attracted members from other parishes who have become "members" of our Parish from afar!

Other Educational Opportunities:

- **EFM:** (Education for Ministry). This comprehensive study course for small groups continues to meet with members committing to 4 years of study together. Very dedicated leaders (Karen Clark and Rachel Pace) keep this program available for our Parish and others who might be interested.
- **Speakers' Series:** The Rev. Dr. Scott Black Johnston brought a new perspective on how our faith plays out in the world around us. Extensive groundwork was laid for a special series of events taking place in February 2024. This committee continues to work hard to bring exceptional speakers to the Parish.

Other Committees:

• Spiritual Growth Committee: Led by Tom Dodson, this committee works to find opportunities to enhance spiritual growth among members of the Parish. Members of this committee serve on the various Faith Formation committees to help create a spiritually enriching program for all adults. Some of the offerings this year have been a quiet retreat at Trinity Center as well as monthly quiet reflection times at Mt. Lebanon Chapel.

FAITH FORMATION - YOUTH MINISTRIES

Our St. James Youth Ministries has had a busy 2023. Thanks to the leadership of Cookie Cantwell, Jane Rippy, Jonathan Graves, and other dedicated members of the St. James family, we've taken on some great new projects and developed some wonderful new programs.

The mission of St. James Parish Youth Ministries is to create a safe environment where we respond to the spiritual, emotional, psychological, social and physical needs of 6th through 12th graders by providing programs, activities, worship and mission experiences where Jesus Christ will be known and served.

OutReach COMMISSION

Why are O and R capitalized – because we embody reaching outward, beyond the walls of the Parish to assist those in need or requiring support. **What are we** – St. James OutReach is comprised of the commission chairs Ashley Walton, Taber Stockstill-Tornes, Alex Wnek and independent Mission Volunteer Leaders "chairs," and individual volunteers willing to give time and financial resources to help others within each mission.

The OutReach Commission submits an annual budget to the vestry with financial projections for the coming year. Funds are allocated to missions based on verified need, expressed need with substantiation and event fees supporting a result-based occurrence (ex. Rise Against Hunger). We are a Commission comprised of internal "missions" or "ministries" with a 3-tiered approach: protection, guidance and help (the symbolism should not be lost). The Commission is a conduit to ministry. The OutReach Commission's planned calendar is comprised of events, Long term visioning, planning, thoughtfully responsible financial support and "Call to Action" events requiring immediate/unexpected response to direct crisis management.

2023 Year in Review:

- Help Hub Emergency Financial Assistance, referrals and connections to community resources, guidance, and support.
- **Rise Against Hunger** September Annually a volunteer-based program that coordinates the assembly of nutritious dehydrated meals deliverable to need-based areas around the world in 2022 St James executed 50,000 meals in a single event, in 2023 35,000 meals. This may move from under OutReach in 2024 to Parish-wide events.
- A Safe Place Prevention, advocacy and restorative programs assisting victims of sexual exploitation and trafficking.
- Episcopal Farm Workers Ministry EFWM is a joint project of the Episcopal Diocese of East Carolina and the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina. The ministry coordinates direct services, leadership programs, community education programs, and advocacy in support of the community agricultural workers (farmworkers, meat processing plant workers, and workers from nurseries, packing houses and poultry, swine, or livestock farms) and immigrant families in rural NC.
 - General support over the course of the entire year ** Need a Parish Mission liaison
 - Christmas gift support 2023 over \$2,000 in Amazon deliveries were executed by St. James
 - Back to School BackPack Campaign
- One Love Tennis Tennis and academic enrichment program created to improve the life prospects of at-risk children in the Wilmington community by engaging them in productive activities that teach discipline, build confidence, improve school performance, and encourage a healthy lifestyle.
- Community Boys and Girls Brigade Boys and Girls The mission and core beliefs of Boys & Girls Clubs fuel the commitment to promoting safe, positive and inclusive environments for all. Boys & Girls Clubs of America supports all youth and teens of every race, ethnicity, gender, gender expression, sexual orientation, ability, socio-economic status, and religion in reaching their full potential. ** Looking to advance this relationship in 2024
 Angel Tree Program 150 individual Children's Gifts
- Backpack Campaign {serving EFWM} July/August Annually 80+ individual children issued a backpack containing basic education and classroom supplies.
- New Hanover County Disaster Coalition Equitable and efficient communication and collaboration across the community to improve disaster preparedness and recovery for all in preparation of and post-disaster.
- **Good Shepherd** The mission of Good Shepherd Center is to feed the hungry, shelter the homeless, and foster transition to housing. St. James was a founding Parish and has retained roots of support to the organization.
- Eden Village Eden Village of Wilmington is a 31-unit tiny home community specially designed to provide permanent homes for chronically homeless individuals including patients of the local hospital. Many patients of the medical center experience chronic illness, which are treatable but require consistent living circumstances to improve treatment results. A home is an essential component to long-term health care for these individuals and a proven, permanent solution to chronic homelessness. Residents of Eden Village may live in the village for the duration of lifespan provided they are able to maintain the nominal rental fee, adhere to internal policies and provide support to the community itself by (examples) serving on the farm, working within the village store or on the grounds committee.

2023 Year in Review (Continued):

- Northside Co-Op The Northside Food Cooperative is a community-owned cooperative grocery store planned for the Northside of downtown Wilmington that will ensure food security and end the food desert, generate resilience in our neighborhoods, and create a self-sustaining business model that will enhance the local economy through equity and ownership. Additionally, Northside hosts Frankie's Market - a Saturday Farmers Market and community dinners - feeding 150+ community residents in a communal evening event (Thursdays in season).
- **2Share** 2Share delivers gently used furniture and home goods free of charge to families in need in the greater Wilmington area.

Support concluding in 2023 -

• Cape Fear River Watch - A permanent nonprofit organization, open to everyone, dedicated to the improvement and preservation of the health, beauty, cleanliness, and heritage of the Cape Fear River basin. The CFRW mission is to protect and improve the water quality of the Cape Fear River Basin for all people through education, advocacy, and action.

Forward Facing Involvement: 2024

- **Trinity Center** an island refuge on the Southern Outer Banks. Trinity Center is home to Camp Trinity, a residential Episcopal summer camp that allows campers to share in a Christian program that helps them grow spiritually and emotionally while giving them opportunities to develop new interests, skills, and friendships. It is also home to The Sound to Sea Environmental Education Program, the only residential environmental education program on the Outer Banks, which offers school groups a multi-disciplinary hands-on learning experience and hands-on educational programs for adults as well through our Road Scholar programs.
- **POP Plastic Ocean Project** Ocean, waterway, field and forest advocacy for the clean up of harmful non-recyclable "trash" affecting marine life, wildlife and human life in the form of the food we consume and air we breathe.
- St. James Campus Community Support Opportunities More to come at a later date.
- **Glory Ridge** Glory Ridge is a multi-denominational Christian camp founded in 1973. The camp is located in Madison County, North Carolina on 26 acres overlooking the French Broad River. The camp has been used by local and out of state groups alike. Glory Ridge is a simple place for Christian retreat & worship all year long. St. James Parish has been a long time partner to Glory Ridge for Mission Based Youth Events.
- Habitat for Humanity Cape Fear Habitat is dedicated to helping build hope, homes and community. As donation centers ReStore, home goods, furniture, building supplies, and more. Items are resold to help support the mission of affordable homes in our community.

The Parish Life Commission strives to create fun opportunities for people to connect with one another in a faith community.

While we never want a ticket cost or entry fee to prohibit someone from participating, we want to encourage everyone to contribute the suggested donations to help ensure our budget can continue to support larger events.

Men on a Mission, affectionately known as "MoM," is a group of approximately 200 St. James men who join forces in a fun way to focus on Service and Fellowship at St. James and throughout our community. The MoM Squad has had a very busy and fulfilling 2023. We are so thankful for these men, their service, their leadership, and their fellowship.

2023 WITH MEN ON A MISSION:

These are just a few of the wonderful things happening with MoM!

- Regular Serving opportunities at the Good Shepherd Center and the Sgt. Ashley Center saw MoM Squads serving dinner to the homeless families and veterans three times monthly.
- Volunteering with A Safe Place. MoM helped raise awareness of sex trafficking in Wilmington by presenting ASP materials to owners, managers and employees of businesses where victims are most likely "groomed". They also helped with construction and maintenance projects at the ASP shelter.



- April 2023 Mission Trip to Glory Ridge Glory Ridge is a special place to many at St. James. They help serve so
 many in their community. A MoM Squad spent a long weekend providing construction and maintenance
 improvements to the camp that facilitates so much good for not just families in need, but our St. James Youth
 and countless other youth seeking to serve God by making work worship.
- Weekly pickups and deliveries for 2Share Each Saturday members of MoM pick up donated furniture and fixtures, and delivers them to families in our community that have almost nothing in their homes.
- **Special Projects** Throughout 2023, MoM served several members of our parish family with special projects and other small construction needs.
- Thanksgiving with the Boys & Girls Club and Northside Food Co-Op. MoM Showed up in force to make sure that area families had plenty to feast on this past holiday season. We can't say enough about their generosity.

AN UPDATE ON 2024-2025 REGISTRATION

St. James Day School Registration for the 2023-2024 Academic Year opened to St. James Parishioners and current SJDS Families on January 8th, 2024 and was met with great enthusiasm. As of now, we have a waitlist for all classes. We do anticipate a few families to change plans before September so we encourage you to reach out regarding the waitlist if you are interested in enrolling for the upcoming school year. We are so thankful for the families and friends who have spread the word about our wonderful program and staff.

ST. JAMES FOUNDATION

In 2023, the St. James Parish Foundation provided \$74,450 in contributions to support the capital needs of our Parish and has more than \$4,271,066 under management as of Dec. 31, 2023. Contributions to the Parish are based on requests from the Vestry through a concerted effort to fund distributions from income and appreciations.

The Foundation was established in 2003 as a 501(c)3 organization with the mission of supporting the needs of St. James Parish in perpetuity. The Foundation supports its mission by providing financial contributions to the Parish through targeted distributions for capital or specific campaign-related needs. Those contributions are through the assets that have been so generously donated to St. James Parish over the years by its congregation.

In 2023, approximately \$98,856 in cash and stock donations were generously given to the Foundation. Since inception, \$2,722,061 has been donated to the Foundation, with \$1,023,941 in distributions made directly for Parish use.

Last year also marked the formalization of the Foundation's long-range plan. In coordination with the Vestry, the Foundation established distribution and growth targets ahead of the Parish's 300th anniversary in 2029. The longrange plan agreement targets 2-4 percent annual distributions and a capital campaign in partnership with the Parish to raise money for identified capital improvement needs. In addition, the Foundation created an endowed pledge account, also managed by the Foundation, where parishioners may endow their annual pledge by contributing to the account, and an annual 4 percent distribution will be made to the Parish based on a trailing 12 guarter average account value.

Historically, up to 4 percent of the Foundation's assets are used annually to provide financial support for campus expenses such as the repair and replacement of the church roof, storm restoration, structural repairs, and operational expenses. Foundation investments are managed by an outside professional investment firm with concentrated efforts to appropriately manage and grow the Foundation assets. In addition, a Foundation committee works directly with the investment firm to monitor and report on the health of the Foundation assets to the board.

For the year ahead, the Foundation plans to host the William & Alexander Society celebration in the spring of 2024 to recognize those who have made planned charitable gifts to the Foundation. The Society is named for the gentlemen who made the first three bequests to St. James. In 1739, William Flavell left 200 pounds in his will for the construction of "an English church in Newton" - an earlier name for Wilmington. William Faris, in 1757, and Alexander Duncan, in 1768, left money to finish the church building, which took 19 years to complete (1751-1770).

Of course, if you haven't included St. James Parish in your estate planning, but would like to do so, any Foundation Director or Maria Hollopeter, Financial Administrator, can provide the details of how the Foundation can help. Leaving a lasting legacy to St. James for the continued preservation of our campus and facilities is one of the finest gestures that can be made to honor the church.

MT. LEBANON CHAPEL

We've had a busy 2023 at Mt. Lebanon Chapel! We'd like to take a moment to share with you some of the highlights as shared with us by Frank Hamilton, Mt. Lebanon Chapel Board Chair.

In 2023 we...

- Improved accessibility into the Cemetery by installing pavers from the entrance to the All Saints Memorial Garden thanks to a generous gift from Bill Oakley.
- Worked to maintain the structural integrity and longevity of Mt. Lebanon Chapel by replacing rotten exterior siding.
- Maintenance thinning and trimming of the trees around the Chapel. This serves both to beautify the grounds and to prevent potential storm damage from falling limbs.
- The Cross atop the Chapel was straightened and its fastenings were replaced as a donation from one of the teams who performed work on the campus.
- Purchased tables and chairs, which are stored at Mt. Lebanon Chapel and dedicated to MLC events, i.e. Parish Picnic, etc.
- Installed stainless steel hinges on all windows.
- Constructed and installed the Rugged Cross at the Labyrinth and Bradley Creek with the help of several parishioners. A special thank you to Pem, Lee, and Frank.
- Frank Gwathmey built a new Baptismal stand, skillfully crafted to match the interior design of the Chapel.









HISTORY OF MT. LEBANON CHAPEL

In the early 1830s, Dr. Thomas Henry Wright conceived the idea to build Mt. Lebanon Chapel. The chapel was to serve those members of St. James who lived in the vicinity of the Greenville, Wrightsville, Masonboro and Middle Sounds, and those who vacationed in the area during the summer months. Dr. Wright paid for the construction of the chapel, with the exception of a few contributions from other members of St. James Parish.

The chapel was completed in 1835. The land was part of a 320-acre tract known as "Mount Lebanon," named for the surrounding cedar trees that recalled the Biblical "Cedars of Lebanon." Dr. Wright decided to give the chapel to St. James Parish. However, he died without having deeded the building and its surrounding acreage. The property passed to his son, Adam Empie Wright. Adam also died without formally passing the title to St. James Parish. Not until 1875 was the property deeded to St. James Parish by his son's guardian, Mrs. Marion Potter for the sum of one dollar, as per the intent of Dr. Thomas Wright.


