

From the Rector

Dear St. James Parish Family,

Happy Anniversary! With gratitude Jennifer and I (and family), this month are completing our first full year with St. James and here in Wilmington. To be sure, we would not have imagined in 2020 that God had such wonderful plans in mind. We remain thrilled that God has brought all of us together, and given us important work to do. I have a longer message in mind regarding my first year as your Rector, and I invite you to anticipate that letter later in July.

For now, I'll admit that this passage from the prophet Jeremiah is one of my favorites. The theological and spiritual affirmation that God is in control is comforting. I've been reflecting on it more often recently, as I ponder and pray over so many things that might seem beyond (or out of) control. For me, it's helpful to remember that Jeremiah lived in a time of great unrest. Like any notable prophet, he sought to "comfort the afflicted, and afflict the comfortable" Jeremiah leaned more often, though, toward the vision of comfort. Throughout, Jeremiah sought to remind the beleaguered people of Israel of the importance of their faith and their responsibility toward their neighbor.

Here's the reminder that I find most helpful. God's plans, as articulated by Jeremiah, are not to make us happy, or wealthy, or even to live in complete peace and comfort. Rather, God's promise is one of hope, pointing all of us toward a future where God is already waiting, where we will never be alone, and where together we will be with him.


Our Gospel readings this season are set in the last weeks and days before Jesus' final entry into Jerusalem. We hear more than once that his "face was set," and that his vision was clear. Jesus understood God's plan, one which would bring him to the cross and then to defeat death itself. How wondrous. Turns out that Jeremiah was spot on, even for the human Jesus. There has never been a plan, in fact, more beautifully designed to give us hope - in the here and now, and then a future we can neither earn nor deserve, yet which we shall obtain through the gift of our faith.

On a related note, in light of the increased attendance with the lessened COVID risk and recent events nationally, the vestry did discuss and support Rector Craig's suggestion that the parish Safety Committee be re-engaged. They will review the previously-prepared Security Recommendations and update it to our current reality. Please know that any and all prudent precautions will be taken to ensure your safety at all parish events.

We are so excited to have Gray & Caitie Hodsdon who will be joining us beginning Sunday, July 17th downtown in our sanctuary. Please join us in giving them both our warmest St. James welcome!

For those that did not hear about our recent unfortunate excitement, just before the Great Thanksgiving during the Convention Service (and in the middle of an extreme storm event), our recently replaced roof sprung a leak. Accolades to our Facilities Manager, Wes Clewis, and others who immediately acted in such a gratuitous manner that the service continued unimpeded amidst adding collecting containers and mopping around the main altar. The entire Diocese and our Bishop expressed appreciation for the way everything was handled.

For those who worship this summer at Mount Lebanon Chapel and have experienced challenges hearing the service, please know that we heard you! This month the vestry approved a proposal to improve this situation with the replacement of the sound system. Please look forward to better acoustics as we worship in such a sacred place - but know that we cannot do anything to quiet the sounds of nature all around!

Please do check out the feature below about the recent 139th Diocesan Convention prepared by our Parish Administrator, Florence Ellen Cowden. St. James was well represented with Phillip, Cheryl, and five Delegates. COMING SOON: "TELLING YOUR STORY"
GUIDED AUTOBIOGRAPHY CLASSES

We would like to know who would be interested in joining us for a special class with the Rev Mary McKnight, Certified Instructor of Guided Autobiography. This course encourages us to reflect on our spiritual and mental growth as part of our Living Well series.

Life is a story, with all of its ups and downs; challenges and discoveries. Guided Autobiography offers a series of themes and unique resources to help participants recall, organize and write their stories, two pages at a time. The seven-week process often allows participants to gain new perspective on their lives. Sharing parts of their story in a small group committed to confidentiality can bring insights not available from simply writing or journaling.

Guided Autobiography is a 45-year-old research-based program that has helped many people to recall and share their life stories. This class is for YOU if you want to write your stories, even if you have never thought of yourself as a "real" writer. Mary McKnight is a retired pastor who has led many small groups, including writing groups and retreats. She knows from experience that being in a Guided Autobiography group can be a rich and quite meaningful experience. The stories generated from the class could well become a legacy gift to hand down to your family. After all, who wouldn't treasure a few pages written by one of their great-grandparents?

2-hour classes for 7 weeks: Exact dates and time to be determined based on interest, most likely a weekday morning beginning mid-September. Blessing the Labyrinth

TOGETHER WE LEAVE A LEGACY

This spring, St. James began a very special project. With the support of the Vestry and the Mt. Lebanon Chapel Board, a permanent Labyrinth is being installed at Mt. Lebanon Chapel. It is our hope the Labyrinth will offer the wider community and St. James parishioners an opportunity to experience the ancient means of walking meditation that has been used by different cultures for more than 4000 years. The singular, circular path, leading to the center and returning to the outside, offers a time for reflection, a time for prayer, a time for centering, a time for calming the mind and spirit, and a time to listen to the quiet whisper of God.

In celebration of the Labyrinth's installation, St. James hosted a very special Blessing of the Labyrinth on Tuesday, June 21st:

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Almighty God, we thank you for the beauty of creation, for making us in your image and likeness, and for calling us to be your people and follow you on the path of holiness and life. We offer this work of human hands, a Sacred Path, to be set apart and blessed as a place of prayer and worship, discernment and discovery, healing and reconciliation, celebration and thanksgiving, to the praise and glory of your Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

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After the 9:30 a.m. Service, on Sunday, July 3rd, our Parish family is invited to gather together around the Labyrinth for an aerial photo session, as a drone will be helping us document our beautiful addition to the Mt. Lebanon Chapel grounds.

Installing the Labyrinth at Mt. Lebanon Chapel has a fundraising goal of \$46,500. We're over halfway there! To date, we've raised \$28,750 for this special project. Together we are building a great spiritual tool for our parish and our wider community.

AROUND THE PARISH

UN-SUNG HEROES - MEET THE ST. JAMES CHOIR

We see and hear the St. James Choir each week, and we might know the faces. With this Grapevine issue we begin to introduce the members of the choir, beginning with those who have served longest, and who share what it's like to lift our praises to the glory of God and in service to St. James Parish by means of a very special ministry.

Martha Bachman - I grew up in a household where Mother was a Presbyterian, Daddy was a Southern Baptist and our Northern Ohio town of 2500 people had neither of those denominations, so we became Episcopalians! Mother sang in the choir all her life, and I started in the children's choir (with my beanie) as soon as I was allowed in - I think that was when I was seven. I learned that music strengthened my faith and augmented the liturgy. I remained in choir through High School and continued when I attended Goucher College in Towson MD. where I majored in music theory and was a member of the Glee Club and Choir. I didn't participate in a choir for a number of years after college, but in 1985 I moved to a small town in NJ where there was a wonderful small parish - St. Peters, Essex Fells. I was a lay reader, choir member, substitute choir director, and organist. When Gus and I moved

to Wilmington in 1999, we found that St. James had a good music program and we quickly became members. The choir is an amazing community, with each one of us expressing our love of God through our music.

Carol Ellis - Knowing that I was looking for a new church home, a UNCW colleague invited me to St. James Parish in the spring of 1969. I attended for several weeks and was introduced to Charlsie Harris, the thenorganist and choir director. Music has always been an important part of my life. Once Charlsie learned that and that I had been in church choirs since I was 12 years old, she "recruited" me for the summer choir. I was confirmed that fall and have been a St. James choir member ever since. The combination of worship, music, service, and fellowship that St. James offers has been and continues to be a blessing to me.

Billie Holland - I have been a member of St. James for over 40 years.

After attending for a short time, I joined the choir. I have always enjoyed singing and actually sang in the small church choir of my childhood. Through the years I have worn many different hats at St. James but the one that is always there for me is the choir. I find it very rewarding to be a part of the regular services and then also to be a part of the special times, such as Evensong and seasonal celebrations. Thanks be to God for helping me "make a joyful noise."

Jim McFarland -My earliest memories are of my mother singing in our little church in Rutherfordton, NC where I lived until I was ten. Mom could control the room playing any song anyone wanted to hear and singing along, leading the chorus, I remember her every time I sing. Mom made me sing in several choirs

and take piano lessons which refined my voice and ear and the singing inspired me, the piano not as much. We traveled a bit for singing as well and it became a big part of my life. We moved to Durham where dad took a job at Duke and I continued my singing at the First Presbyterian Church downtown which had a very large sanctuary, perfect for singing, and I was inspired once again. One of my fondest memories was of singing a solo in Duke Chapel for the gathering, it was truly an out-of-body experience that inspired me even more deeply. When I was 13 the family decided to move to Columbia, SC, my church in Durham asked me to sing for them before I left. It went badly, my voice cracked fifty times, I barely got through the songs and I was mortified. We up and moved to a new town virtually the next day and I didn't sing again until I joined the St. James Choir in 1992. I had been coming to services for six months or so when word got out I could sing a bit. David and Candy, choirmasters at that time, began to ask

me to join the choir which helped obviously, but I wasn't quite comfortable with my voice. A few years later it was Jamie Graves, a beautiful, powerful tenor voice, in our choir at the time, that was the one that inspired me fully once again by awing me with his voice and praising me when I sang. I was having fun again singing and was hooked, I truly missed it the years I was away. It is truly an uplifting thing to sing, singing in the shower, in the car, in the church, whether you hit the notes or not, it is a prayer and a blessing wrapped up in one and it has never failed to make me happy.

139TH CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA



St. James was honored to host the Opening Eucharist service on Friday, June 3, 2022. It was a beautiful service with great representation from all over our diocese. It is special to remember we are part of something much bigger than St. James Parish in Wilmington. Our diocese includes 67 Episcopal churches in eastern North Carolina.

There were two workshops on Friday afternoon, "Disaster, Relief, Recovery and Preparedness Commission (DRRPC): Are You Ready?" and "Racial Healing Commission: Stories that Work." Our own Ginny Woodruff played a part in leading the Racial Healing discussion and serves on the Racial Healing Commission for the diocese.

On Saturday morning we all met at the Ballast Hotel for a time of worship and Bishop Skirving's address. Following Bishop Skirving's address, we listened to presentations for proposed Mission Priorities. The lineup included:

- Rev. Dr. John Pollock, chair of the Commission on Ministry for the diocese spoke about our first mission priority which calls us to LEAD by supporting our worship communities and equipping lay and clergy leadership as they live into the promises of their baptismal covenant.
- Emily Gowdy Canady spoke about the second priority which was to LEARN by developing opportunities for lifelong formation.
- Rev. Richard Elliott discussed the third priority which was to SERVE, by strengthening partnerships in our communities to serve the
 most vulnerable in our communities.
- Rev. Skip Walker spoke about the fourth Mission Priority which calls us to HEAL as we advocate for justice & peace for all of God's children.

We were thrilled to meet the new Executive Director of Trinity Center, John Koch. Trinity Center is in great hands with John's leadership. We heard from the Trinity Board that major repairs are being completed at Trinity Center thanks to the money raised by the Journey Through East Carolina initiative started by Bishop Skirving.

Nine resolutions were passed ranging from Racial Healing to gun violence. After elections, the convention closed as it began, with worship and music. The St. James convention delegates were Rev. Phillip Craig, Rev. Cheryl Brainard, Steve Thomas, Jane Martin, Florence Ellen Cowden, Derrick Miller and Ginny Woodruff.

On our worksites, work is done together and our resident's houses & their lives are improved. Our young people learn about the mountains and their culture. Lives are changed as relationships are built! Back on "the Ridge" there is time to explore the beauty of God's Creation...... the French Broad River, walking to the Overlook, sitting with friends on the top of "the Ridge, or in the Worship Pavilion talking, sharing, laughing, being together with no other distractions. Yes, Glory Ridge is simple and filled with time and space to ponder the glory and the love of our God!

YES! We worked hard on four different homes! We helped restore electricity and running water to a family whose home had been damaged by a fire and we purchased a new refrigerator & washing machine for her. We removed a rotten deck from another resident's home and build a new porch for her to enjoy. Another group built steps at two locations so the elderly residents could walk out of their houses safely. We built relationships with people who lived differently yet we worship and love the same God. We served. We listened. We learned. We laughed. We worshipped. We discovered the deep joy and God's Love & Grace together. We came back to Wilmington tired and dirty ready to go back to Glory Ridge in 2023!


