Dear Parish Family,

On June 1st, we mark together the second anniversary of my first day as Rector of St. James. In many ways these two years have passed by so quickly. At the same time, I am deeply proud and grateful for all that God has called us to accomplish together, and I remain thrilled and excited for my role in our shared ministry. We have so many, many blessings to celebrate.

Anniversaries offer a good opportunity for reflection and inspiration. With that in mind, I want to share with you an important decision I spoke of in the pulpit this past Sunday. If you were not present, I encourage you to watch my sermon. A replay of which is available at *stjamesp.org/schedule*.

From my very first interactions with the Rector Search Committee in 2020, and in all of the various surveys I read, and in the countless large and small and wonderful conversations I have had with you - members of this parish family - over these past two years, it is abundantly clear to me that St. James rightly places the highest premium on gathering together in worship. The number one priority in the St. James Strategic Plan? Worship!

Martin Luther once wrote this: "At home, in my own house, there's no warmth or vigor in me. But in the church, when the multitude is gathered together, a fire is kindled in my heart and it breaks its way through." These words are inspiring.

With the intent to glorify God first and foremost, and also to honor the incredible value of our worship together, this fall we are going to modify our Sunday worship schedule. I ask that you prayerfully open your hearts and minds to this new timeframe for regularly worshiping together.

Beginning with our Welcome Sunday on September 10th, I am calling for us to bring our 9:00 a.m. and our 11:15 a.m. worshiping communities together. To have our traditional Rite I service at 8:00 a.m., Christian formation from 9:00 - 9:45 a.m., and then one main worship service at 10:15 a.m.

I'm announcing this decision in May, with many weeks to go before the schedule will change. I ask you to support it - and that you share this transition with Jesus as your focus.

The value of **worshiping together** is powerful. Let's see together what this will be like. I want us to try this new schedule firmly until our Annual Parish Meeting on January 8, 2024. Along the way, there will be many opportunities for reflection, thoughts and feedback - all of which I will welcome.

I trust in my heart that this will be an exciting and worthy and valuable endeavor. That it will offer a time to inspire, support, inform, and nurture us as we prepare each week to serve as witnesses in the world. And I <u>firmly</u> believe that God will show us the way.

I remain honored to serve as your Rector, and I look forward to many conversations with you in the seasons to come.

A couple important campus updates, the Buildings and Grounds committee and Wes are actively working on moving forward with building repairs involving the Great Hall Kitchen. Poverty, by America by Matthew Desmond

POVERTY, BY AMERICA MATTHEW DESMOND

FROM THE COMMITTEE ON RACIAL UNITY

Over the past decade or two, it has become fashionable to attribute major social ills to underlying "systemic" and "structural" causes. The search for these systemic and structural factors has much to recommend in its attention to context and history, but it pushes to the side a crucial element: personal agency. If we can explain away so many problems as a result of larger forces – whether capitalism or racism or globalization or technology or countless others – where does that leave individual accountability? In the book, *Poverty, by America*, sociologist Matthew Desmond, stands in opposition to this prevailing trend as he argues that ending poverty will require change, not only at the policy level, but at the individual level too. All of us, he urges, "must become poverty abolitionists, refusing to live as unwitting enemies of the poor." He encourages all of us to conduct an "audit" of our lives, personalizing poverty by examining all the ways we are connected to the problem – and to the solution.

Throughout the book Desmond presents various factors that contribute to economic inequality in the U.S., including housing segregation, predatory lending, the decline of unions, and tax policies that favor the wealthy. But what he adds to the discussion of poverty is the assertion that affluent Americans benefit from corporate and government policies that keep people poor. If that's the case, he asks, "Why then would those Americans who profit from the status quo even want to approach poverty as a problem that needs solving." Desmond answers. "In a broader sense, we are all being immiserated by poverty. It's there in the morning paper, on our commute to work, in our public parks, dragging us down, making even those quite secure in their money feel diminished and depressed. It's there in that residue of shame and malaise coating our insular lives."

One review went so far as to say, "Desmond is well aware that his righteousness about our shared responsibility for poverty will cause discomfort, but his purpose is to draw our attention to what is plainly in front of us."



A YOUTH SUNDAY SERMON

Good morning everyone. I would like to start off by introducing myself. My name is Peyton Sumrell and I am a senior at Laney High School and I will be attending Auburn University in the fall to study business. I know I probably do not look too familiar to most of you this morning because I typically attend church at Port City Community on Sundays. There I teach the kindergarten Sunday school class each week but have attended St. James youth group over the course of the last school year.

Youth Sundays are not a foreign concept to me because before St. James I was a part of another episcopal church youth group in Wilmington where I fell in love with things like the Trinity Center, Sunday night get-togethers, and of course the community of people my age and those who advise over them. Now being a senior myself it is surreal and an honor to be alongside Will and Web this morning.

If you have ever had the pleasure of being a part of a youth group I would like for you to think about how that group made you feel. From bible studies to retreats, and even fun activities there is always so much love for each other being shared. Excitement is in the air and friends new and old share lots of laughs, stories, and even meals. Sometimes those feelings can also show themselves through tiredness at 7:00 a.m. on Wednesday mornings, Sundays at Happening, and at 9:00 a.m. in the pew but you always know that you are welcome, loved, and taken care of just the same since you are surrounded by your church family.

When reflecting on what to say this morning, those same feelings I thought of when I looked back on youth events reminded me so much of Jesus and his disciples. Jesus loved others so well, which shows us how important it should be to love in our day-to-day lives too.

Jesus loved the sinners, the unclean, and everyone in between setting the example for us to follow his lead. A question to ponder among yourself is this... in what ways have I loved and ways I did not love today?

John 14:15-21 reads "If you love me, keep my commands. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another advocate to help you and be with you forever— the Spirit of truth. The world cannot accept him, because it neither sees him nor knows him. But you know him, for he lives with you and will be in you. I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you. Before long, the world will not see me anymore, but you will see me. Because I live, you also will live. On that day you will realize that I am in my Father, and you are in me, and I am in you. Whoever has my commands and keeps them is the one who loves me. The one who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I too will love them and show myself to them."

What a wonderful message Jesus was teaching to his disciples. If you have loved today you show that you are one who Jesus loves too. He lives in our hearts all the time even when we feel distant or frustrated with Him. With the love that Jesus has shown us so well we should use his love when speaking and acting with others. It's just that simple. We don't need to have this extravagant act or huge moment where we can show that we displayed the love we have for the Lord and those around us. We need little moments sprinkled throughout the day and for lots of people to make God's love truly have an impact.

During the course of this week and hopefully beyond, I hope you remember these few things. Jesus talked to His friends a lot about how we should identify ourselves. He said it wouldn't be what we said we believed or all the good we hoped to do someday. He said we would identify ourselves simply by how we loved people. It's tempting to think there is more to it, but there's not. Love isn't something we fall into; love is someone we become. No one expects us to love them flawlessly, but we can love them fearlessly, furiously, and unreasonably.

I just finished reading a book titled *Everybody Always* written by Bob Goff. I highly recommend everyone read it but one thing he said about love is what I want to leave you with.

"You'll be able to spot people who are becoming love because they want to build kingdoms, not castles. They fill their lives with people who don't look like them or act like them or even believe the same things as them.

They treat them with love and respect and are more eager to learn from them than presume they have something to teach."
