LENT AND TRANSITION

Lent, and once again, you might be thinking but nothing much changes. Yet if you open yourself, Lent makes its bid on you to ponder a change of heart, if not a change in practice. You consider a change of heart in Lent, the way a nun considers intercessory prayer; by rolling the beads of a rosary between her fingers, half-in and half-out, of her inward searching soul.

Lent bodes transition. Beginning with the Ash Wednesday invitation for "the whole congregation to be put in mind of the message of pardon and absolution set forth in the gospel of our Savior, and the need which all Christians continually have to renew their repentance and faith." (BCP p. 265)

We are a church in transition. Your search committee fingers its way through resumes and sermons, a rosary practice, if you will, searching in the beads of insight for the competence and faithfulness candidates have so prayerfully crafted on resumes. But transition is not always a process direct from A to Z. Most of the time, the church's leadership establishes strategic outcomes and then works backward, step-by-step, to create the necessary preconditions to accomplish. During a period of transition, leaders start where people are and work forward, step-by-step, through leaving the past behind, getting through the wilderness, and profiting from it, and then emerging with new observations, insights and missional spirit.

When Moses navigated the transition zone of the wilderness, many were tempted to turn back for Egypt because, at least, back there they knew what to expect. Flights of mutiny must have been tempting when the pilgrim community, headed for the Promised Land, had second thoughts causing them to "murmur." One of the things they must have murmured was, "Do you think Moses has any plan, or do you think he's making this up as he goes along?" Let me assure everyone, there is no need to turn back or worry about the promise of what is next. Your wardens, vestry and search committee will be guided by your voices in the parish profile and have composed the architecture for a transition and search that is sure to find the pastor God has in store for St. James.

NOTICE: ALL Worship Services Suspended

Fellow Parishioners,

In this ever-changing world, we are now dealing with a very serious virus (COVID-19) that is even more rapidly and somewhat unpredictably evolving. In the past 24-48 hours, the level of nationwide concern has escalated exponentially due to concern over spread. The overall mindset has changed to focus on minimizing the chance the virus has to expose multiple people at once – at large gatherings in particular. Given the seriousness of this concern and the role St. James must play as protector of people and leaders in showing how to display love to others, the Vestry & Clergy have made the very difficult decision to suspend ALL primary worship services (8am, 9am, 11:15am on Sundays), Coffee Hour, and Christian Formation classes effective immediately. For all other activities and meetings, please reach out to your group leader for direction on meeting.

As mentioned above, this decision was not made lightly, but there are two primary reasons this step is necessary. One is the aforementioned need for all large gatherings to take a temporary break in order that the virus has a chance to go inactive. The second and more critical reason is that our services are attended each Sunday by a large number of folks that are the highest risk for COVID-19. We simply must protect them and their health and this is the best way to do so. In discussing this decision, we kept coming back to how we would all feel if someone were to contract the virus and suffer, due to our decision to continue services?

We all deeply and critically value our worship together. We hope and pray that this will be a very short period of separation. We will communicate any updates we hear and would ask you to do likewise. This suspension will remain in effect until health officials and our elected State and Local leaders indicate a return to normal gatherings has been deemed safe. Remember, we remain the Body of Christ together through anything and please continue to talk with one another and pray always. As one Vestry Member, Jane Martin said, "...this does not mean that our ministry stops. There are many ways we can [continue] that beginning with phone call checks, leaving things at doors, etc." We encourage each of you to be creative in ways St. James can be just as active and striving to do God's work during this period. Video worship pieces have already been recorded and will be offered for you to use as you may choose. Share your ideas and love one another! Jane also said, "...can we even imagine the feelings and joy we will have when we are worshipping together again!" Truly, she is correct and we look forward in trust that His will be done.

SPIRITUAL GROWTH MOMENT: APOSTLE TALK

Webster's Dictionary defines "apostle" as one who is sent forth. In our case the 12 guys who followed Jesus around. You may think that these guys are the only apostles to roam the Earth. This is a common misconception because I believe that everyone in this room is an apostle. Just by agreeing to come to Happening, you are saying that there is a little part of you that wants to learn a little more about Jesus and that you just might want to follow his word, hopefully. We are all "sent forth" by God to preach his word, just like we have done this weekend.

This whole weekend, we have all participated in the common theme of community and family. We have had meals together, listened to talks, shared our feelings with small groups and really got to know each other. This feeling of community is what I believe being an apostle is all about. We all get to talk about and spread the word of God here at happening and beyond.

I think about how hard Cookie works at it and I want to be a part of whatever she has planned for us. Again, the theme of community is what drives us as Christians. Getting into that youth room, with all my church family fills my heart with joy. It's a special feeling when you get to be a part of such a close-knit family. We are doing the same thing here at Happening. Many of us have come here not knowing each other, but as the weekend has gone on, we have made bonds with each other that will last longer than you can imagine. When I told my golf coach that I would be missing my match on Friday, I was pleasantly surprised at his response as he said that he was raised Episcopalian and had been to Happening. He talked about how special it was to him and I thought that was really cool. He is a real life example of the long lasting impact that Happening can have on all of us.

So when you leave the Trinity Center on Sunday afternoon, I want you to take what you have learned this weekend and try to make a difference in this world. Help your parents when they need it. Be there for your friends. Bottom line, try to act as the Apostles did with Jesus. Thank you.
