A CHANGE OF SEASONS

for your soul, it will be your contribution to the Rector Search process. Not everybody will be able to interview candidates, but remember, candidates have their eye on us as I speak. RECTOR SEARCH COMMITTEE UPDATE:

What we're doing. What we're learning. How God is leading us.

In the gospel for the first Sunday in August, we hear about how Jesus fed the five thousand with five loaves and two fishes. It's a miracle story. It's a story of God's provision. It's a story of God's concern for our most basic physical needs. Some of us might wonder if God still works this way. Or if he's still active in our individual or corporate lives. Some of us feel that we can see God at work around us – especially when we stop to listen, see, and think. Jay Sidebotham likes to call these instances “*God sightings*.” He likes to ask folks both young and old to reflect on what *God sightings* they have had on any given day. Usually, there has been at least one. Your Rector Search Committee is excited to report that, as we look back over our work together, we can identify multiple *God sightings*.

A couple of us were interested in serving on this committee but had travel and other commitments that would have made it impossible to fulfill all our committee obligations. Then the coronavirus came ashore; schedules opened up. We had planned for the first organizational meeting for the week of the initial lockdown. We decided to proceed to meet via Zoom. It worked. We have met every Monday afternoon since – and we've had 100% attendance at all but one meeting when just one member had to miss. Neither that frequency nor that attendance level would have happened under normal circumstances.

We have begun every meeting with a time of scriptural reflection and prayer. Every member has led us at least once. And it never fails that there is something that touches, nourishes, and challenges us. We have so far been able to listen to different points of view without taking disagreement personally; and we have eventually come to be of one mind on every decision we have had to make. That would seem rare in today's world.

We have been led, through extensive networking, to over fifty priests who seem like men and women who are both gifted and committed to spreading the gospel. We have been able to connect by telephone with each one. Nearly forty are interested in entering into a mutual discernment process with us to determine whether they are being called by God to lead our parish. We have seen the Vestry and Strategic Planning Commission complete their work just in time for us to factor it into the search process. We have learned a great deal about our parish through the focus groups and the Holy Cow survey, the results of which were presented to us over a two-and-a-half-hour meeting with a senior research analyst during the third week of July. Some of what we learned was encouraging and reinforced our existing perceptions. Some of what we learned has been surprising. Some have been sobering. All have been helpful.

We have seen God at work in many ways. *God sightings have been real.*

The most recent has been how all the different pieces that have to be in place before we can receive applications from interested priests have begun to come together. We have wondered how we could adequately tell St. James' story to those who don't know us – in what is commonly referred to as our Parish profile. Just over the last week or so, we have realized that so many aspects of who we are have already been expressed – in our Parish website; in our newly adopted Strategic Plan; in the RenewalWorks reports from 2017 and 2013; in all the comments made via the Focus Groups; in what we learned from the survey; in what we as a committee have experienced as part of this wonderful congregation.

As we reviewed all of that, the Parish Profile, which is attached, nearly wrote itself. That was a God sighting for us, for sure. We hope you will feel that we have adequately told our mutual story. Along the way, we have continued our work in other areas, building out our search website, communicating where we are in our process with potential candidates, and finalizing a portfolio of 67 questions and answers that will represent the official posting of the position with the Office of Transitional Ministry, known as the OTM. We are working hard towards that electronic posting on the OTM site being completed by the end of September. At that point, we will be open to receive applications, all of which will come through OTM and then be vetted by the Bishop's office.

So, we are thankful for all the ways God has been at work around and through this search process. We are all grateful to be a part of this important work. And we will keep our eyes wide open for more God sightings as we move forward.
